Fairfax County Wildlife Biologist Vicky Monroe reached out to Long Branch to let us know deer-vehicle collisions are a serious public safety concern as development continues and the population grows in Fairfax County. Over 55% of all deer-vehicle collisions each year are recorded in October, November and December during the rut (deer breeding season). Watch Neighborhood Watch News

As most of you are aware, the big news in Fairfax County has been the string of burglaries that have taken place throughout the county. The suspect is accessing homes and vehicles at night, and is targeting money, purses and small items. While there have been no incidents in the West Springfield district, we should continue to remain cautious and take steps to secure our homes and vehicles, especially at night. The suspect is entering cars and homes that are unlocked and therefore locking doors and windows may be the best deterrent. In addition to standard safety precautions, police are suggesting the following:

- -Do not leave items of value or garage door openers inside unattended vehicles and ensure your vehicle is locked.
- -When returning home, try not to leave purses, cash or keys near an entryway.
- -Promote safety by using the exterior lights on your home as well. If you notice suspicious persons or activity, call the non-emergency police number (703-691-2131) and report it.

If you are able to volunteer for a week of patrol duty for Neighborhood Watch, please don't forget to indicate that you are willing to help out and be sure to include your best contact information including an email address. The Long Branch Civic Association membership drive is in full swing. The membership fee is \$30 for two years. These rates assume **at least 90%** neighborhood participation in our association as our board works to provide needed services and optimize costs.

As detailed in the budget, your membership fee covers costs of advertising the annual neighborhood yard sale, curb painting, entryway maintenance, printing (directory, luminary fliers and instructions, newsletter, membership forms), Web site fees, and all social functions.

Come and have a scare at the fair! Canterbury Woods is having their annual Fun Fair on Saturday, October 23rd, from 10:00 am. until 2:00 p.m. Come and check out the haunted hallway, moon bounces, games, international food and concessions for the entire family.

Parent-teacher conferences are one of the most important ways you can learn about your child. In these conferences, you can see how well your child is doing. You can meet the teacher face-to-face to let him or her understand your child better. You can also ask for suggestions that will make it easier for you and the school to work together throughout the year.

But successful conferences don't just happen. Here are five tips that can help you have a more successful parent-teacher conference:

- Plan for it. Before you come to your conference, write out some questions you'd like to ask. Here are some suggestions:
 - o How is my child doing in class?
 - Does my child use time well? Does he or she have good work habits?
 - Does my child read at the level you would expect for this grade?
 - Does my child usually turn in homework? Does he or she have missed assignments?
 - Is my child able to do the math that you would expect for a student at this grade? What are my child's strengths and weaknesses? (You'll want to share your ideas about this as well.)
 - Does my child have friends? How well does he or she get along with others?
- Keep an open mind. Your goal is to work for cooperation between you and your child's teacher. Even if the teacher says something you disagree with, try to listen to what he or she has to say. Later, you can add your own thoughts.
- Ask to see your child's work. There's no better way to see how your child is
 progressing than to look at his or her school work. You can judge for yourself
 whether your child is making progress.
- Ask for suggestions. If your child is doing well, ask what you can do to keep
 things on a positive track. If there are problems, ask what you can do to help.
 If a teacher identifies problems, ask for ways you can work together to solve
 the problem. If he or she can't give you any ideas immediately, ask for a
 follow-up conference.
- Clarify and summarize as you go. Teachers sometimes use educational buzz words. If you don't know what an "IEP" is, for example, ask. If you are confused or uncertain, you won't be able to help your child.
- Follow up. Stay in touch with the teacher. If you try some activities at home, let the teacher know. If you think of a question you didn't ask, write a note.

STUDENT SAFETY IS AN URGENT ISSUE!

Parents, all Frost students who live across Rt. 236/Little River Turnpike are provided bus transportation to/from school every day. This transportation includes late bus service as well. Frost students SHOULD NOT CROSS Rt. 236 on foot when going to and from school unless accompanied by a parent or guardian. Numerous students are seen trying to cross this busy thoroughfare every afternoon and there have been near-fatal encounters with people and automobiles as recently as last Spring. Please talk with your student today about the real risks involved.

Woodson High School

The Woodson PTSO has drafted and approved a resolution regarding FCPS plans for a new bus lot very near Woodson High School. The resolution was presented to the PTSO membership on September 14 for discussion and a vote.

Please read below about this new bus lot and its potential impact on the community, and please read and understand the PTSO's resolution.

Property on the southwest corner of Little River Turnpike and Pickett Road (near Woodson and Frost) is under consideration to be a new bus lot, with 51 school buses plus 37 private vehicles of the drivers. There are many issues for each member of the immediate and the extended communities should consider. Congestion, security matters, added noise, and environmental concerns top the list, but there are many other items. Please read the background and information we have prepared.

After you have had a chance to read and consider this information, you are welcome to peruse our campus-comparison. We have constructed it in order to help demonstrate that the Woodson campus already has more than its share of FCPS-support facilities. Please click here.

To All Our Trick-or-Treaters—Have A SAFE HALLOWEEN

- Swords, knives, and costume accessories should be short and flexible.
- Avoid trick-or-treating alone. Walk in groups with a trusted adult.
- Fasten reflective tape to costumes and bags to help drivers see you.
- Examine all treats for choking hazards and tampering before eating them. Limit the amount of treats you eat.
- Hold a flashlight while trick-or-treating to help you see and others see you.
- Always test make-up in a small area first. Remove it before bedtime to prevent skin and eye irritation.
- Look both ways before crossing the street. Use established crosswalks wherever possible.
- Lower your risk for serious eye injury by not wearing decorative contact lenses.
- Only walk on sidewalks or on the far edge of the road facing traffic to stay safe.
- Wear well-fitting masks, costumes, and shoes to avoid blocked vision, trips, and falls.
- Eat only factory-wrapped treats. Avoid eating homemade treats unless you know the cook well.
- Enter homes only if you're with a trusted adult. Otherwise, stay outside.
- Never walk near lit candles or luminaries. Be sure to wear flame-resistant costumes.



Also, to all our parents and teens, please drive extra slowly through our streets—our little goblins are out there and not always easy to see. Make this a safe and fun Halloween for everyone.

Also—don't forget—FCPS has teacher workdays scheduled for the Monday and Tuesday after Halloween—so no worries about a late night—no school the next day!
